Since assigned to the Criminal Investigation Division I have investigated and participated in investigations of adults and juveniles, both as suspects and victims of crimes. My assignments and experience includes criminal investigation of property crimes, crimes of violence against persons, frauds, drug investigations, child abuse, and covert and electronic surveillance operations. During the past 16 years I have received, and continue to receive, specialized training through schools, law enforcement agencies (Federal, state, and local), and seminars. This has included specialized training in criminal investigations, interview and



interrogation, search warrants, criminal and psychological profiling, criminal investigative analysis, crime scene searches, analytical investigative techniques, conspiracy investigations, and criminal intelligence.

On November 3rd, 2006, the Wake County Sheriff's Office responded to 5108 Birchleaf Drive, Raleigh, NC in reference to the murder of Michelle Young. Mrs. Young's body was discovered by her sister, Meredith Fisher. Meredith Fisher reported that she had stopped by the Birchleaf Drive location at the request of the decedent's husband, Jason Young. According to Ms. Fisher's statement, Mr. Young called her on the morning of November 3rd, 2006 and asked her to pick up several computer printouts that he had left on his home printer. The printouts were said to have been of a belated anniversary gift. Mr. Young supposedly did not want the decedent to discover the surprise gift he was planning for her.

Meredith Fisher has stated that she responded to her sister's home, passed through the unsecured garage, and entered the residence through the garage / kitchen door. Once inside she walks through the residence and ultimately discovers the decedent lying on the floor of her bedroom and calls 911.

In addition to discovering the decedent, the decedent's child was reportedly discovered by Meredith Fisher as well. She said the 2-1/2 year old child was discovered under the sheets on the decedent's bed. Ms. Fisher has stated that the child was clean and her feet showed little to no signs of having walked through the blood that had pooled around her mother. The bed sheets on the side of the bed where the child was located showed no obvious sign of blood as well. This description is in contrast to the small-bloodied footprints that were found on the floor of the child's bathroom.

Once responding deputies arrived on the scene at 5108 Birchleaf Drive, the scene was secured and later processed by the City - County Bureau of Identification. As standard practice, CCBI photographs a crime scene showing the conditions that existed when it was secured. This practice was followed at 5108 Birchleaf Drive and led to photographs being taken of a shelf / hutch area in Cassidy Young's bedroom. In the photographs an 8 fluid ounce bottle of Extra Strength Tylenol Adult Rapid Blast Liquid is shown. The liquid in the bottle is red in color. On the same shelf as the bottle of Tylenol is a "dropper" which is commonly used to deliver liquid medications to children. Contained within the pipette of the dropper, there appears to be a red liquid residual.


Due to the location of the Tylenol and the dropper, it is believed that the medication was delivered to Cassidy Young. It is further believed that the medication was delivered to the child under the mistaken belief that it would cause drowsiness. Once the child was asleep, the perpetrator would have been able to commit or continue their attack without worrying about interference from the child.


Based upon this affiant's training and experience, it is believed the preceding facts establish probable cause to believe the above described item, the dropper, may contain DNA and/or fingerprints from the person

For these reasons, this affiant respectfully requests this warrant.

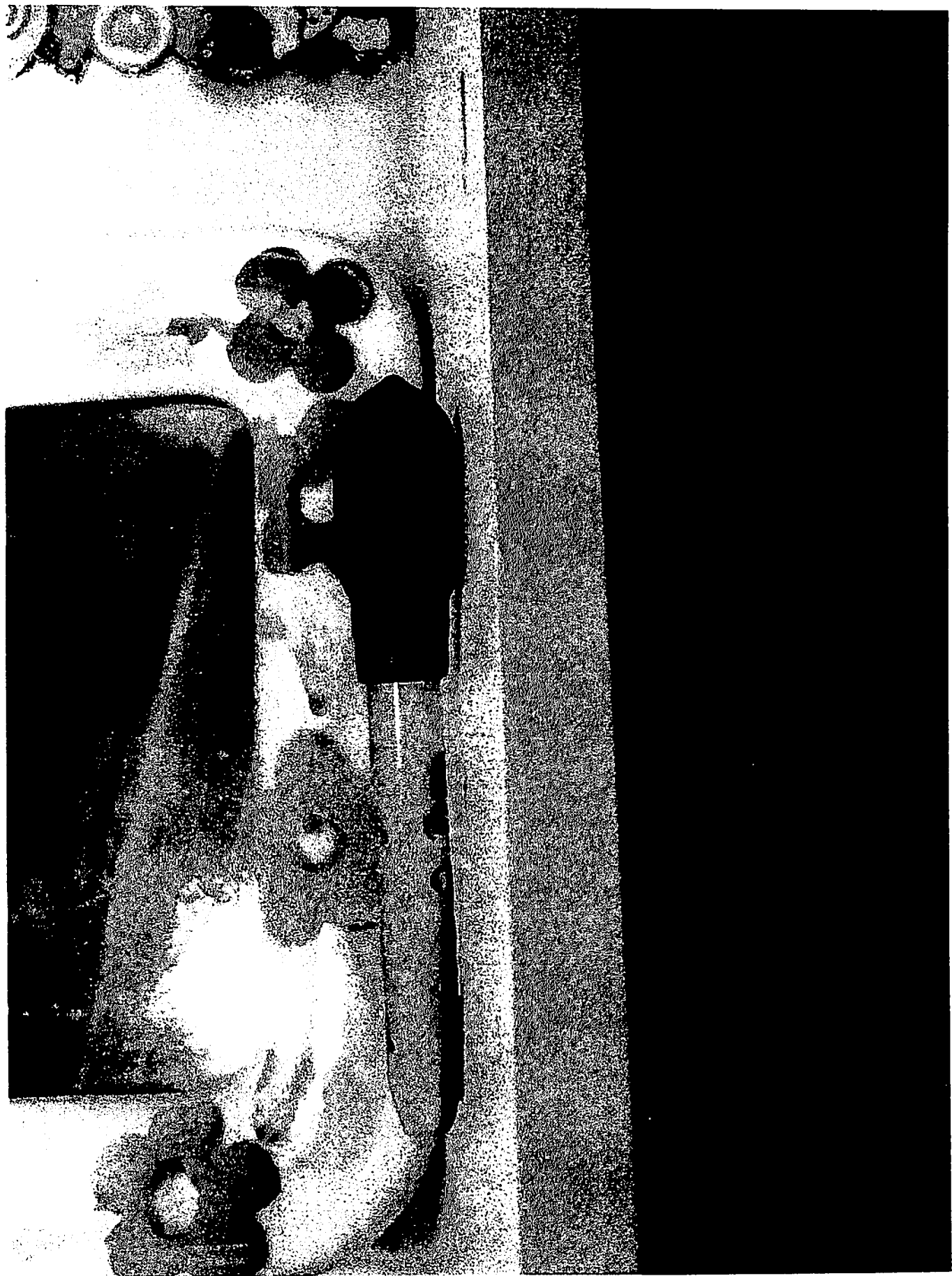
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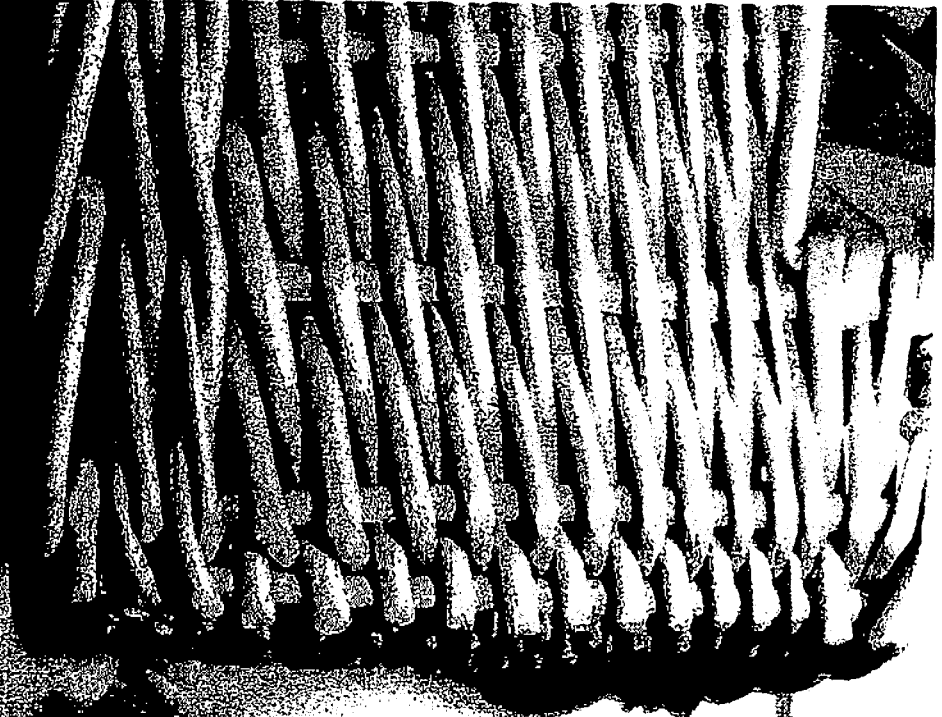
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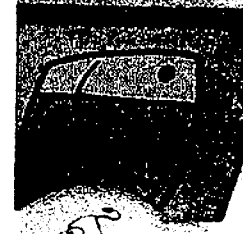
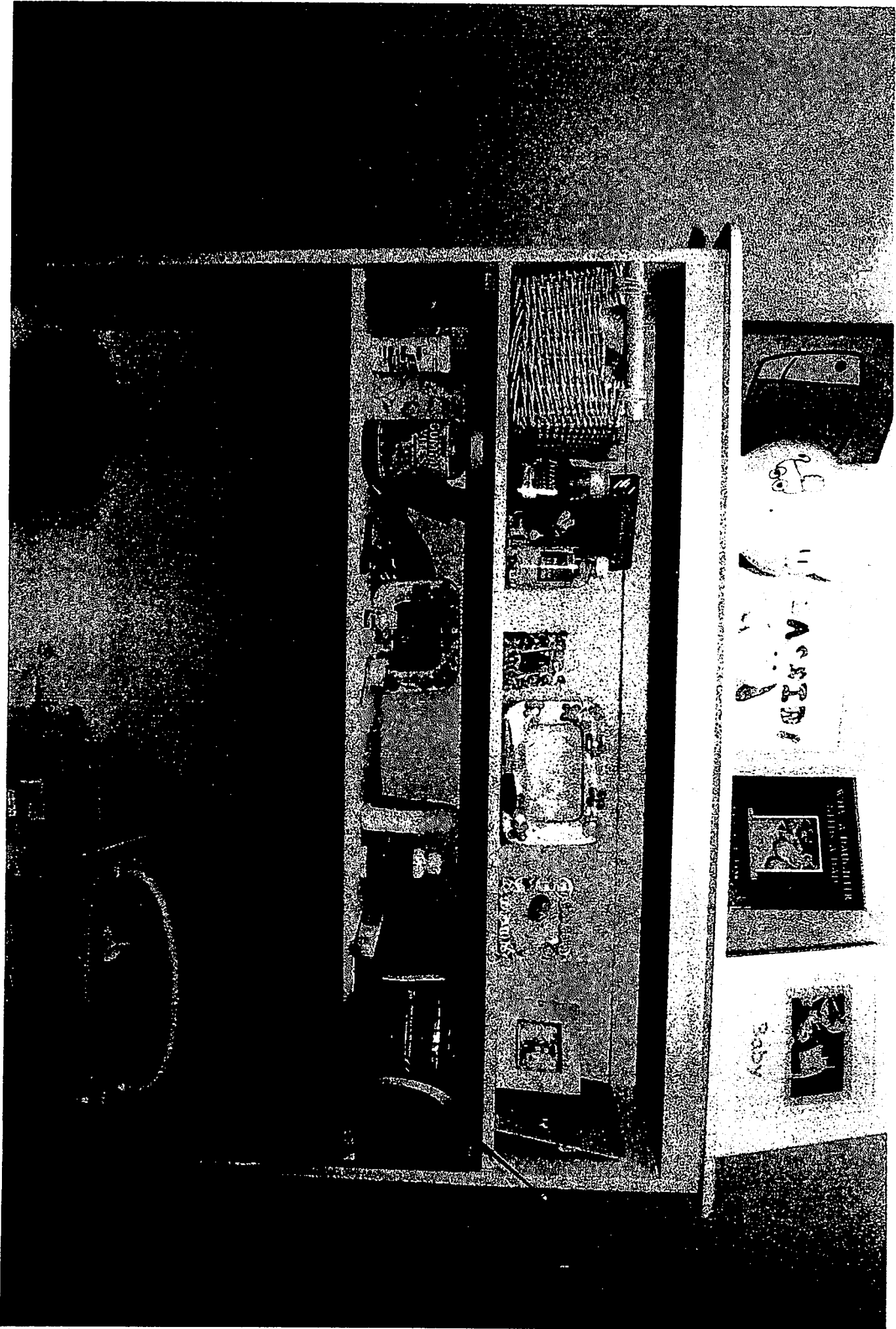

GENERIC NAME: acetaminophen

BRAND NAME: Tylenol and many other

DRUG CLASS AND MECHANISM: Acetaminophen belongs to a class of drugs called analgesics (pain relievers) and antipyretics (fever reducers). The exact mechanism of action of acetaminophen is not known. Acetaminophen relieves pain by elevating the pain threshold, that is, by requiring a greater amount of pain to develop before it is felt by a person. It reduces fever through its action on the heat-regulating center of the brain. Specifically, it tells the center to lower the body's temperature when the temperature is elevated. Acetaminophen was approved by the FDA in 1951.

PRESCRIPTION: no

GENERIC AVAILABLE: yes

PREPARATIONS: Liquid suspension, chewable tablets, coated caplets, gelcaps, geltabs, and suppositories. Common dosages are 325, 500 and 650 mg.

STORAGE: Store tablets and solutions at room temperature 15-30°C (59-86°F). Suppositories should be refrigerated below 27°C (80°F).

PRESCRIBED FOR: Acetaminophen is used for the relief of fever as well as aches and pains associated with many conditions. Acetaminophen relieves pain in mild arthritis but has no effect on the underlying inflammation, redness and swelling of the joint. If the pain is not due to inflammation, acetaminophen is as effective as aspirin. It is as effective as the non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug ibuprofen (Motrin) in relieving the pain of osteoarthritis of the knee.

DOSING: The oral dose for adults is 325 to 650 mg every 4-6 hours. The maximum daily dose is 4 grams. The oral dose for a child is based on the child's age, and the range is 40-650 mg every 4 hours.

When administered as a suppository, the adult dose is 650 mg every 4-6 hours. For children, the dose is 80-325 mg every 4-6 hours depending on age.

DRUG INTERACTIONS: Acetaminophen is metabolized (eliminated by conversion to other chemicals) by the liver. Therefore drugs that increase the action of liver enzymes that metabolize acetaminophen (e.g. carbamazepine, isoniazid, rifampin) may decrease the action of acetaminophen. The potential for acetaminophen to harm the liver is increased when it is combined with alcohol or drugs that also harm the liver.

PREGNANCY: Acetaminophen is used in all stages of pregnancy.

NURSING MOTHERS: Acetaminophen is excreted in breast milk in small quantities. However, acetaminophen use by the nursing mother appears to be safe.

SIDE EFFECTS: When used appropriately, side effects are rare. The most serious side effect is liver damage due to large doses, chronic use or concomitant use with alcohol or other drugs that also damage the liver.
